The Center was originally designed to provide homeless families with children a safe place to stay during the day but has expanded since its founding in 2016 and now helps more than 600 at-risk families and individuals annually. The center offers not only shelter and a hot meal, but also provides help with job searches, obtaining disability payments, and applying for housing benefits.

Anyone who is in Grand Junction Friday afternoon, November 3rd, is invited to meet at the Joseph Center at 1pm for a tour of the facilities.

IT'S HUNTING SEASON!

Time to start collecting hides for the Veterans Leather Program!

The Veterans Leather Program relies on the charity of hunters across the nation to donate hides so they can be turned into leather used for therapy programs for recovering veterans.

Leather is also used to provide professionally-crafted gloves for veterans in wheelchairs, which are distributed at veterans adaptive sports clinics and gatherings throughout the country.

IN 2021-22:

- **9** states collected **13,401** hides.
- **1,059** veterans received free wheelchair gloves.
- **71,294** square feet of leather was donated by Elks to provide free craft kits for recovering veterans.
- **5,800** veterans received craft kits from the Elks

Essay Contest Participants Will Consider Bill of Rights

The topic for this year's Americanism Essay Contest is "What the Bill of Rights Means to Me."

This is the second year to have the new divisions and monetary prizes. The contest has separate divisions for fifth, sixth, seventh, and eighth grade students. For each division, first place wins \$1,000, second place earns \$500, and third place gets \$250.

There are some very important dates to remember. If you miss your deadline, your essay will be ineligible to win. Keep in mind that all initial essays should go to the Local Lodge first for judging. It is important to communicate this information to your schools and teachers.

Keep in mind that you should send your essay to the Elks Lodge nearest your home, and only to one Lodge! Each level of judging will send the top three in each division to be judged on the next level.

Deadlines

- Student/teacher sends essays to Local Lodge: No later than December 15, 2023.
- Local Lodge sends to District Chair: No later than January 31, 2024.
- District Chairman sends to State Chair: No later than February 28, 2024.
- State Chair sends to Contest Administrator: No later than March 31, 2024.

Rules

1. No more than 300 words. Essays must be typed or legibly printed in ink (by the entrant).
2. Must be submitted to the Lodge nearest their address.
3. The participant must be identified by name, grade, school attending, and the sponsoring Elks Lodge on the essay itself.
4. The cover page provided on our website must be attached to the essay. This cover sheet will follow the essays through every level of judging.

Judging and scoring

1. Originality. Avoid the use of clichés and worn-out words and phrases. 30 points.
2. Development of the theme. Stay focused on ideas and thoughts. Don't ramble. 40 points.
3. Mechanics and neatness. Use proper spelling, grammar, and punctuation. 30 points.

Publicize your contest via social media, newsletters, and e-mail blasts, as well as through local newspapers and radio. Prizes at the local level are also a good idea for increasing participation.

National winners of first, second, and third place in each division will be announced in our spring newsletter. Awards can be picked up at the Fraternal Committee booth at our next Grand Lodge Session in Austin, Texas on July 3, 2024.

5. *Adopt a solutions-oriented approach.* A solutions-oriented mindset can help us stand out from the crowd, as it demonstrates the ability to tackle challenges head-on and find innovative solutions to problems. By focusing on possibilities rather than obstacles, we showcase our resourcefulness, creativity, and determination – highly attractive qualities to others. To adopt a solutions-oriented approach, practice reframing challenges as opportunities for growth, brainstorming multiple solutions, and being persistent in the pursuit of success.

By implementing these game-changing strategies in our own Lodges, we can transform the way we, the Elks, are perceived and become a beacon that draws the community together. Our mission as leaders is not only to attract new members but to have our current members engaged and excited to belong to our Lodges.
